JUNE 2001

Prime Minister Junichiro Koizumi announces an initial pledge of US\$200 million to the Global Fund.

JANUARY 2002


The Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria (the Global Fund) is officially established.

DECEMBER 2003

Prime Minister Junichiro Koizumi announces an additional contribution of US\$50.3 million.

MARCH 2004


Friends of the Global Fund, Japan (FGFJ) is established.
